## **Commission on Stewardship Report to the 115<sup>th</sup> Annual Council**

Mission: To mobilize clergy and lay leaders to develop stewardship resources, enabling parishes to worship joyfully, serve compassionately, and grow spiritually.

This past year has been a time of change for the Commission on Stewardship. In August, long time member Archdeacon Juan Sandoval resigned from the commission to pursue other callings. Although he will be greatly missed, we are excited to see what God has in store next for Juan as we know he will be a blessing in whatever capacity he is called to serve.

We were blessed this year to have Ginny Heckel from St. James Episcopal Church in Clayton, GA, join the commission. Ginny comes to us with unique talents and a fresh perspective. She has already become an integral member of the commission and we look forward to continuing on this journey together.

With these changes, the members of the Commission on Stewardship are Tammy Pallot, Chair (Macon), Mal Underwood (Cartersville), Julia Gable (Decatur), Bill Monk (Sandy Springs), and Ginny Heckel (Clayton) who serve under the faithful guidance and leadership of Canon John Thompson-Quartey with assistance from the amazing Sally Ulrey.

Most parishes in the diocese are currently experiencing a combination of in-person and online worship. Although some people have joyfully returned to in-person gatherings, there are still quite a few people who do not feel safe attending in-person events, including worship. We must respect each person's decision to do what they feel is best for them. Although it can be challenging, we are called to include people in the life of the church in as many ways as possible. At the August 6 Diocesan Wardens meeting, the Commission on Stewardship presented several options for annual campaigns that combined in-person and online elements.

On August 21, the Commission on Stewardship offered a free Stewardship During COVID workshop via Zoom. The workshop focused on detailed strategies for implementing hybrid annual stewardship campaigns, allowing for in-person and virtual components.
